During the years that I served on CAPP I initiated a strategic planning process and played key roles in forming and revising CAPP's policies in the areas of government relations, legal and regulatory affairs, marketing, state psychological association organizational development, and the administration of a \$500,000 annual grants program.

I formed Task Forces in the areas of Prescription Privileges, Psychologists in Primary Care, and the Business of Practice, which have developed cutting edge strategies and materials for practitioners.

I initiated the \$100 for 100 Days fund-raising campaign, to supplement the Practice Directorate's on-going legislative advocacy efforts, which helped create a war-chest of over three million. Although health care reform in its initial grand version fizzled out (though some parts of it have been salvaged in the recently passed Kassebaum-Kennedy and Dominici-Wellstone bills), the Practice Directorate was very successful in changing minds and hearts in Congress about the importance of providing adequate mental health services to the public.
